## Talk Them Over

## Playing 2/1 Game Force

- When you or your partner open the bidding and your opponents politely stay silent, I'm pretty sure you and partner know what your bids mean.
- But when opponents rudely interfere, things change.
- Some bids don't mean what they would have meant had opponents been silent.
- If you don't have backup agreements, you can get into trouble.

- 1 nt is no longer forcing.
- It is a suggestion to play 1 nt .
- Shows 6-10 points and a stopper in spades.
- Partner can pass, and should pass if 1 nt is the right bid.


## 1 ४ ...(1 \&)...2nt

Hand 2
Responder's hand

- K 92

-KJ5 2
-K 1043

- $2 n t$ is no longer the Jacoby 2nt convention.
- It shows 11 or 12 points, a balanced hand and a spade stopper.
- Partner can pass, and should pass with a relatively balanced 12 or 13 points.


## 1 甲...(1 ) ... 2

- A85
*K Q10 43
- Not a game forcing bid.
- It is, however, forcing for at least one round of bidding.
- Shows a 5+ card suit and 10+ points.


## 1 甲...(dble)... 2

Opener's hand

-AJ 1072
-A J 10
-K 43
- After a takeout double, responder's 2-level bids are not forcing.
- Responder has 8 or 9 points and 5+ clubs.
- If responder had 10+ points, she would redouble.

- Weak bid, showing trump support.
- Non forcing

- A cue bid of the opponent's suit shows $11+$ points.
- 3+ card trump support
- Count dummy points.
- Forcing, of course


# What Bids By Opener Are Forcing or Non-forcing 

- We know, of course, that a non-jump new suit at the two level is game forcing, in an uncontested auction.
- In a competitive auction a new suit at the two level is only a one-round force.
- Responder could have as few as 10 points.
- What bids by opener are forcing?
- First, let's look at opener's non-forcing bids.

- When opener repeats the opening suit at the minimum available level, it is nonforcing.
- Responder may bid again, but may pass.

- 53
- K J 10
- When opener rebids no trump at the minimum available level, it is non-forcing.
- Responder may bid again, but may pass.

- K J 3
- 107
- When opener raises responder's suit at the minimum available level, it is non-forcing..
- Responder may bid again, but may pass.

- Partner bids game. It is nonforcing, of course.
- But be alert for slam possibilities.
