One problem with learning and playing bridge is that there are many variations in the 'rules'.

In these sessions, the presentations are based primarily on "The Right Way to Play Bridge" (RWPB) by Paul Mendelson.

I seriously recommend that you read it and reread it often. Reading each chapter a dozen times is not too many.

The "No Fear Crib Sheet", books by Andrew Robson, publications by Mr Bridge and by the EBU (English Bridge Union) are used.

These all have subtly different takes on matters even though all are ACOL. U3A Beginners' Bridge, taught by Reg Wholey, also has subtle differences.

I cannot say what is "the right thing" – you will have to choose that yourself and most importantly agree with your partner what you do.

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A simple example of this variation – that we will discuss fully later – is what suit to bid with a 4441 shaped hand.

L1 is my shorthand (Length 1) for singleton.



A M Wilkinson wrote "Bridge Step by Step", which was the coursebook at U3A for 15 or so years, however it is "old fashioned" bridge.

RWPB 's \*/ means bid the weaker of those two suits!

Week 2 Evaluating your hand



Most bridge 'rules' are based around points.

Points come in two forms:

HCP (High Card Points)

'Points' (Pts) which are HCP plus extra for shape.

#### HCP:

Ace 4

King 3

Queen 2

Jack 1

There are 10 HCP per suit and 40 in a pack.

An average deal will give you 10 HCP.

Points include adding (and occasionally removing) value depending upon the shape of the cards in your hand. The value often changes as the bidding progresses.

The EBU system files avoid 'points'.

Shape is very important. There are far fewer shapes of hands than you might think and most of those are rare. The entire list is:

The blue shapes are balanced.

The red is the awkward 4441.

Black is unbalanced.

On seeing your hand, evaluate it. There are several ways to do this and you don't need to do all of them every time. However if another player is taking their time, you could determine additional evaluations:

**HCP** 

Pts (Points)

Quick tricks

Playing tricks

SQOT (Suit Quality Overcall Test) – an Andrew Robson tool Losing trick count

...

HCP you already do – make sure you don't have a card hidden behind another.

Initially for Points, add 1 for every card in suits of L5+ over L4.

Initially for Pts, add 1 for every card in suits of L5+ over L4.

5521 gets to add 2 Pts for the extra card in each of the L5 suits.

5431 adds 1 Pt for the 5 card suit.

6322 adds 2 Pts for cards 5 & 6 in the 6 card suit.

I have not found an explicit statement, but it appears that the experts use Pts for unbalanced hands and HCP for balanced hands. The only practical effect of this is to NOT add the extra 1 point for 5332 hands.

Bernhard McGee from Mr Bridge recommends subtracting 1 Pt for the flatest hand of all, the balanced 4333.

The basic requirement to open the bidding is **12HCP**.

You can open with fewer HCP only with suitable shape.

Highly pre-emptive openings will be discussed later.

Light openings (1long\_suit) can be based on

RWPB: 12+ Pts (10..11 HCP) and L6+ suit

Others: Rule of 20

Often these two methods are equivalent.

Despite RWPB being the course book, I recommend the "Rule of 20".

#### Week 2 Evaluating your hand

#### Rule of 20:

```
A light opening (1long_suit) is appropriate if:
HCP (of 10..11) + Length of 2 longest suits is at least 20.
```

```
EG 11 HCP, 5422 can open "1" (11 + 5 + 4 = 20) 10 HCP, 5422 cannot open "1" (10 + 5 + 4 = 19) 10 HCP, 5521 can open "1" (10 + 5 + 5 = 20) 10 HCP, 6421 can open "1" (10 + 6 + 4 = 20)
```

0..9 HCP cannot open a "light" opening.

As the auction develops, your 'points' may change.

Once you have an 8+ card fit with a suit your partner started, you (as supporter) can add shortage points to the length points you have already added:

L2	Doubleton	add 1 Pt
L1	Singleton	add 3 Pts
LO	Void	add 5 Pts.

Say partner opens 1♥, you know he has at least 4 of them. If you have 5431 shape with L4♥, you know you have a fit, so you can add 3Pts for the L1 suit.

```
EG ♠ K ♥ Q754 ♦ AK984 ♣ KT9
15 HCP
16 Pts initially
19 Pts after the ♥ fit.
```

Note that we added shortage points for an 8+ card fit. The fit made the pair of hands better.

If your partner bids a suit in which you do not have a fit because you have a shortage, your combined hands are worse.

Only add shortage points when a fit has been established.

Shortages are valuable because they provide room to trump when the suit is lead.

Equally, once an 8+ card fit has been established, the original bidder of the suit can add shortage Pts to his hand – provided that these shortages are not in suits bid by partner.

L2	Doubleton	add 1 Pt
L1	Singleton	add 2 Pts
LO	Void	add 3 Pts.

It is worth fewer points because extra tricks hopefully come from trumping with the cards in the responding hand – worth a lot (1/3/5).

It is assumed that the trumps in the original bidder's hand are already valuable, so the extra ability to trump with that hand has less worth (1/2/3).

If you **do not have a fit** (have a misfit), consider bidding 1 level lower than the chart on the next slide recommends.

#### Partnership targets (RWPB page 6)

These are more accurate in NT contracts than in suited ones, where shape makes a big difference.

#### **Quick Tricks**

I have removed details originally presented here as being too confusing for the moment.

#### Playing Tricks (RWPB page 82)

Assume the other cards in a suit are equally distributed between the other 3 players (unless bidding says otherwise...), giving any extras to the opponents. Given the number of cards your opponents are assumed to hold, estimate what that many of your top cards will achieve and then add one trick for every card beyond.

Some of these 'playing tricks' need establishing, buy losing some earlier trick.

This evaluation does not appear to be completely analytical.

#### **SQOT (Suit Quality Overcall Test)**

There are the "rules" for what you need to hold to bid an overcall. These tend to say "and a good L5+ suit". But what is "good"?

SQOT provides a measure of goodness – it is in **addition** to all the other requirements for an overcall, not instead of them.

SQOT = Length of suit being overcalled

+ Number of honours in that suit (AKQJT) (includes the 10)

Contemplate overcalling the number of tricks of the SQOT.


SQOT = 6 Don't overcall

SQOT = 7 Could overcall at the 1 level

SQOT = 8 Could overcall at the 2 level – overcall at the 1 level if

that is available.

# U3A Intermediate Bridge Week 2 Opening the bidding

Remember There is only ONE opening bid.

Once the opening bid has been make, the opener is defined, his partner is the responder and the other pair are the overcallers.

Once the opening bid has been made, the meaning of each bid changes.

#### Week 2 Opening the bidding

**Balanced hands** 4333, 4432, 5332

See RWPB balanced hand table, p14.

0..11 HCP Pass

Robson / No Fear

12..14 HCP 1NT (I recommend this simpler scheme)

**RWPB**:

12..14 HCP with rebiddable L5 card major 1major

12..14 HCP with no L5 card major or poor L5 card major 1NT

15..19 HCP 1long\_suit

With 2 L4 suits, open 1H if possible,

else open 1minor, weaker suit if both L4. Other authors have different suit advice.

20..22 HCP 2NT

23+ HCP 2C Conventional – Partners ALERTS.

#### Week 2 Opening the bidding

Planned rebid for balanced hands 4333, 4432, 5332

After opening 1NT, you do not plan a rebid. You have stated your hand position quite tightly (a "limit" bid) and only if partner asks you, do you bid again, and then in answer to his question.

After opening 1 suit, you have a planned rebid to show your balanced point range. Differing authors recommend differing ranges.

#### **RWPB**:

15..16 HCP Lowest NT bid available

17..18 HCP Jump NT bid (needs STOP card)

19 HCP 3NT (needs STOP card)

Sometimes 17..18 HCP and 19 HCP are indistinguishable.

We will review the planned rebids for 2NT and 2C openings another week.

#### Week 2 Opening the bidding

Unbalanced hands (not 4441) Longest 2 suits have over 8 cards

```
0..5 Pts Pass
```

- 6..9 Pts, L7+ suit with 3 of AKQJT, 3- outside Pts 3long\_suit (p65)
- 6...9 Pts otherwise Pass
- 10..11 Pts, L6+ / Rule201long\_suit bid higher of equal, but if ♣♠, bid ♣
- 10..11 Pts, other shape Pass
- 12..19 Pts 1long\_suit
- 8..9.5 playing tricks 2long\_suit (p76)

  This replaces the "20..22 Pts" you learnt previously
- 10+ playing tricks 2C Conventional Partners ALERTS.

  This replaces the "23+ Pts" you learnt previously
- With 2 L5 or 2 L6 suits, bid higher of equal except ♣♠, bid ♣.

#### Week 2 Opening the bidding

#### Planned rebids for unbalanced hands (not 4441)

These rebids will change if, for example, you find a fit in another suit with partner. However this discusses your **plan**.

With an L6+ suit, rebid the long suit or show a second L4+ suit. Generally bid the cheaper suit when you have a choice.

With an L5 suit, rebid the L4 suit (or the other L5 suit)

This is where RWPB becomes a little awkward with 5332 hands bidding 1 major – RWPB says the L5 suit must be good enough to rebid. (p10 para (b))

We will review the planned rebids for 2suit and 2C openings another week.

#### **4441** hands

See RWPB p45.

0..13 Pts Pass Yes, pass with 12 or 13 Pts.

14..19 Pts 1♥ if L4♥, else L4weaker\_minor

8..9.5 playing tricks 1♥ if L4♥, else L4weaker\_minor

10+ playing tricks 2C Conventional – Partners ALERTS.

#### 4441 hand planned rebids

If partner replies with your L1 suit, rebid NT as if a balanced hand.

If partner responds with one of the L4 suits, you have a fit. Bid on as appropriate.

#### **Game objectives**

See RWPB p9.

- 1: 8 card major fit
- 2: NT contract

Use Stayman after a 1NT opening to find a major fit

3: minor contract

Ignore a minor suit fit in favour of planned NT rebid

EW have the pair number of their table plus 6.


When you have played a hand, pass it to the next numbered table in sequence. The highest numbered table passes to table 1.
