## TIP OF THE WEEK: COUNTING WINNERS AND LOSERS

- 1) After the lead comes down in a **suit** contract, **count your losers** in the **Master** hand. The Master hand is usually the one with the longer trump.
- 2) Devise a **plan** to eliminate some losers.
- 3) Decide whether to draw trump or not.

## **Suit Contract Losers come in two forms:**

. Immediate/Quick Losers —> Losers that your opponents can take when they win the lead.

Dummy: KQ4

J65

. **Eventual/Slow Losers** —-> Losers that the opponents can't immediately win, because they're protected by a winning card.

Dummy: AK3

A "Loser on Loser" is a play technique, usually in trump contracts, where the declarer discards a loser card on an opponent's winner, instead of ruffing. Why might you make a loser on loser play?

- . you suspect RHO will overtrump dummy
- . to maintain trump control of the hand
- . you can gain a future ruff
- . to avoid a dangerous opponent gaining the lead
- . to promote a side suit
