## Opener's Response to 1 No Trump Forcing

## A Quick Review of the Forcing 1 No Trump

- A forcing 1 no-trump .
- On only after partner's major-suit opening in $1^{\text {st }}$ or $2^{\text {nd }}$ position.
- You have 6-12 hcps.
- You do not have 4-card support for partner's major suit.
- You do not have a 4-card major suit you could bid at the one level.
- Your task is to listen carefully to partner's rebid and guide the partnership to the best contract.


## Opener's Rebid

- After a major-suit opening and a forcing one no trump response, opener must find a rebid that describes the hand's
- Strength
- Distribution
- One no trump is a one-round force, not game forcing.
- Rebids are different than if you were in a gameforcing auction.
- You must show extra values when you have them.


## With Two-Suited Hands

- 1 ... 1nt... 2 .
- This bid normally shows 5 spades and 4 diamonds, with 12 to 14 points.
- But it is an ambiguous bid. There are certain other hands with which you might make this rebid.

## 1 \& ... 1nt.... 2 .

- This bid can be made with a 3 card suit.
- This is rare, but sometimes it is the only reasonable bid.
- If you have two 3 card minors, it is best to bid clubs, rather than diamonds.

- This is a problem hand. If this was a $2 / 1$ gameforcing auction, you'd bid 2 a, a reverse.
- But, you're not in a game forcing auction.
- Don't distort your values.


## One-Suited Hands

- With a one-suited (6+ cards), you rebid your suit.
- The level of your rebid shows your values and length.
- 2 (M) 12-14 points
- 3 (M) 15-17 points
-4(M) 7+ card suit 12-16 points.

## Treating a Two-Suited Hand Like a One-Suited Hand

- I've said before, if you have a six-card suit and a good four-card suit, you should rebid your four-card suit before you rebid your six-card suit.
- The key word here is a good four-card suit.
- A good suit is defined as having two of the top three honors or three of the top five.

## With Balanced Hands

- If you have a balanced hand, you will have 1 of two hands.
- 12-14
-18-19
- With 15-17 you will open 1 nt
- With $20-21$ you will open $2 n t$
- With 12-14, you will rebid the most convenient minor suit and listen to partner's response.

## The One No Trump Bidder's Second Bid

- Your task is to listen carefully to partner's rebid and guide the partnership to the best contract.
- Your rebid is based on what you hear from partner and what you have in your hand.
